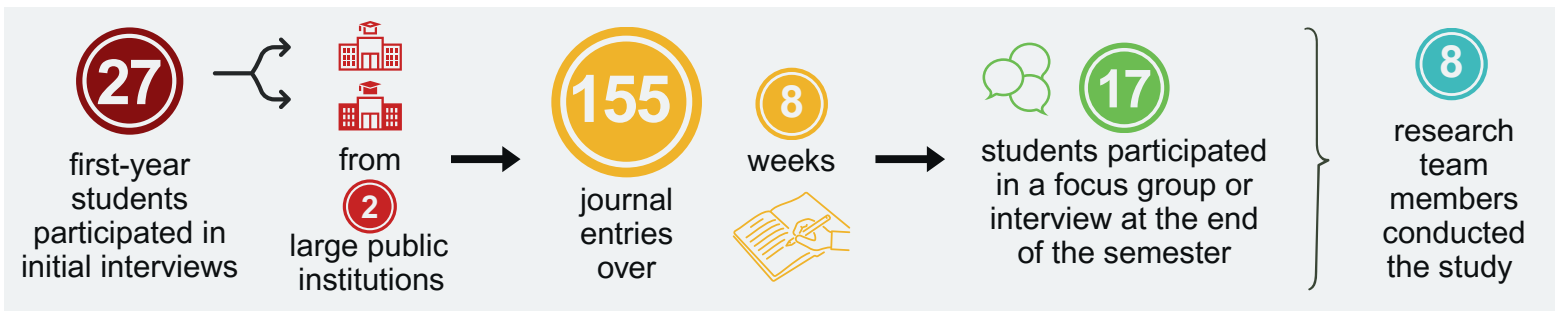
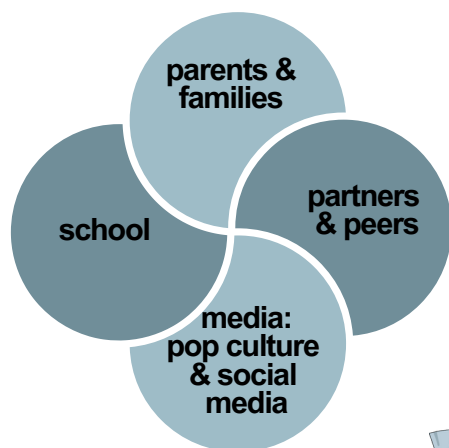


Research Study: College Students' Learning about Dating and Sexual Relationships

Where did students learn about sex and relationships?



examples

Parents & families:

"I just grew up with a sense of very traditional roles, not just in a house but like of what a woman is like and what a man is like... I'm in a relationship right now and I definitely see myself falling into these mental traps that I just don't really want to fall into."

Partners & peers:

"The best advice I have received recently is to stand up for myself. A friend reminded me that my body is special and that if I am not ready to have sex with someone it's more than ok to stand up for yourself and communicate to that other person."

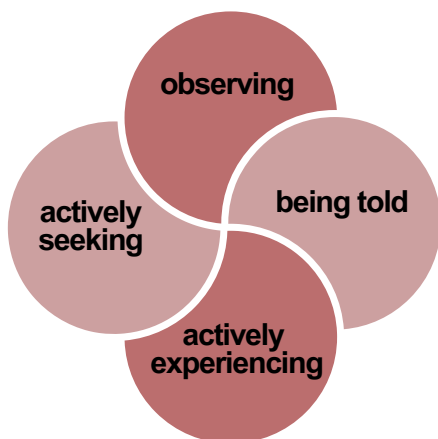
Media:

examples

Observing:

"I just learned what a healthy and a toxic relationship is myself from seeing other people's relationships and relationships with my family."

Actively experiencing:

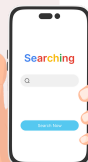
"I think I learned about relationships just from having my own. I mean it's really all experience."

Being told:

"My mom, she would sit down and have talks about it and obviously she would be like, 'Don't do this, don't do that, don't fall for this, don't fall for that.' And she just ultimately told me what to look for in a partner and what not to look for."

Actively seeking:

"I've educated myself through other sources, just like online just doing research myself, but the [state] school system doesn't really teach you anything."

What Else Did Students Share?

Sex ed they received in school was:

- **overly simplified**
- **without nuance**
- **too focused on biological info rather than on actual experiences**



People have **different needs** in relationships.

"I learned that everyone is different and needs to communicate the best way for you to love them."

Examples of **respecting boundaries for everyday things:**

- asking before hugging
- being mindful about touch
- wearing socks around a friend who dislikes feet



Consent is **complex** and **nuanced**.

"A lot of people are afraid [asking for consent is] gonna kill the vibe... it's so sad because it doesn't have to be robotic."

Nonverbal cues as indicators of withdrawn consent or discomfort:

- **change in mood**
- **hesitation**
- **facial expressions**
- **pause in talking**



What is *"the college experience"* when it comes to sex & dating?

Surprise: there isn't one!



Hookup culture is not as common as a lot of students thought it would be.

Relationship Status During Study

In a relationship	12
Casually dating or engaging in sex	5
Previously dated but not currently	5
No personal sex/dating experience	5
